2020 Flower Show

Philadelphia Flower Show *Riviera Holiday* is February 29th through March 8th.

Our exhibit for 2020 is entitled “Ferns in a Mediterranean Breeze”. But don’t be fooled. As an educational exhibit, our plants are exempt from the theme constraints. PHS would rather visitors learn about plants they can actually grow.

A variety of indoor ferns as houseplants will be on plant stands around the sliver of a Mediterranean terrace.

Native wildflowers will be mixed in with the outdoor native ferns as companion plants.

In addition, native bee houses will be placed around the garden to remind our visitors that a healthy garden welcomes insects by providing habitat and shelter for raising young. Since no live “critters” are allowed in the convention hall, the filled tubes will merely resemble larvae overwintering in our garden awaiting spring. Native bees and other insects pollinate flowers to make seeds for the coming year.

Behind the scenes:

As of mid-January, the young ferns and wildflowers are busy emerging under lights in the warmth at PHS Meadowbrook Farm. Rick Reynolds will make strategic plant additions in the weeks leading up to set-up day.

David Green at **Primex Garden Center** has agreed to supply a variety of native bee houses, partnering with us in our exhibit.

Set-up will be on Wednesday February 26, **10 am**. (This is a change from the previously announced 1 pm.) Plants will arrive on Tuesday while a few of our “construction engineers” are building a wall. Unwrapping, grooming and planting will start at 10 am Wednesday. We hope to see you there. Hoagies will be provided for lunch. Contact Leslie Morris Smith if you plan to come.

Fern Tenders (formerly “sitters”) are our ambassadors for DVFWS. They welcome people to our display, answer questions to the best of their ability, or offer reference material. Ambassadors can write down questions to look up later and e-mail the answer to the visitor. They also indicate our activities —field trips, meetings with programs, and hand out brochures to people who are interested in joining.

There are 9 days and 3 shifts (4 on weekends) each day with two people tending each shift. That makes 60 helpers needed! Sign up started at our November meeting and 41 slots are filled. Five people signed up for two shifts on different days, so you know this is really a lot of fun.

One of the perks of being a Fern Tender is that you get a ticket that gets you into the show **before** the public arrives at 10 am (8 am on weekends). This allows you time to see much of the show without the crowds. You may bring a friend to sit with you or be placed with another DVFWS member. If convenient, consider volunteering two or more days. Tickets will be mailed February 18th.

Hope to see you there!



Saturday, April 18th Shenk's Ferry Wildflower Preserve

Saturday, June 6th Henry Botanic Garden, Gladwyne, PA

This must-see garden is the home of the Henry Foundation for Botanical Research. "The Henry Botanic Garden is a historic garden created by Mary Gibson Henry (1884 – 1967), who was a noted 20th century horticulturalist, naturalist, and skilled field botanist. This garden provides a stunning untamed oasis in the heart of Gladwyne, Pennsylvania. The garden is home to an impressive number of superb collections of prominent plant families. With a strong focus on woody plants, a visitor can expect to see Magnolias, Styrax, Hamamelis, Halesia, and Rhododendrons — as well as a notable collection of herbaceous plants. The garden features broadly varied terrain portraying a host of natural environments, from high rugged stony outcroppings and spare alpine sites, to lush dappled forests, to soothing riparian glens, to broad open meadowland." (from their website <https://www.henrybotanicgarden.org/visit/>) Our guide will be Susan Treadway, President of the Henry Foundation.

Directions: **40.053397 -75.286326; 801 Stony Lane, Gladwyne PA.** Stony Lane is an extension of Henry Lane. Turn onto Henry Lane at its intersection with Conshohocken State Road. From Conshohocken: Drive east on PA Route 23 about two miles. Turn left onto Henry Lane. At the bottom of the hill, turn left onto Stony Lane and then right at 801 Stony Lane and follow the driveway through the gates to the main building. The American Fern Society

The American Fern Society is over 120 years old. With over 900 members worldwide, it is one of the largest international fern clubs in the world. It was established in 1893 with the objective of fostering interest in ferns and fern allies. They exchange information and specimens between members via their publications and spore exchange. They sponsor Fern Forays every summer to provide opportunities to learn more about wild ferns from experts and to meet other people with a similar passion for ferns. In January

1978, DVFS (before we added wildflowers) was welcomed as a new chapter.

The Hardy Fern Foundation

In the Seattle area, a few individuals were captivated by ferns. In 1989 they came together and formed the Hardy Fern Foundation, to share their enthusiasm for this fabulous plant, to educate and to bring new ferns into cultivation. The organization grew. It developed relationships with fern enthusiasts around the world. Tapping into a long history of fascination with these ancient plants and cultivating an excitement not seen since the Victorian fern craze.

Today you can come to the Rhododendron Species Botanical Garden in Federal Way, WA to see their collection of hardy ferns, growing in happy companionship with towering Douglas Firs and Red Cedars, a host of rare and exotic plants, and, of course, a world class collection of rhododendrons. Also, come to see their amazing stumpery garden. This spectacular garden is the largest of its kind built in over 100 years. The small group in 1989 has now grown to include national, international, and dedicated local members, each of them undertaking the wonderful walk into the unfurling world of ferns.

Their website lists DVFWS along with other American and international fern clubs in England, South Africa, Canada, and the Netherlands. <https://hardyferns.org/fern-websites/> Our Charter Member John Scott and deceased members Jack and Rose Marie Schieber have gone on forays with the British Pteridological Society also listed with Hardy Fern Foundation.
