Flower Show Returns to Philadelphia Convention Center

We will be joining six area Plant Societies to exhibit together at the 2023 Philadelphia Flower Show March 4-12. It will return to the Pennsylvania Convention Center, conveniently located next to the Reading Terminal Market in Center City, a popular lunch spot. The Jefferson Station of Septa Regional Rail is also adjacent. The exhibit of potted plants will be over fifty feet long on shelving and blocks supplied by Pennsylvania Horticultural Society in the Horticourt.

The entire show will be better than ever! From Melissa O'Brien's article on the PHS website: The 2023 Philadelphia Flower Show will place special emphasis on the representation of garden and landscape designers of varied backgrounds, experiences, and specialties, offering them a platform to make their unique artistic voices heard. "Every exhibitor is creating a unique, spectacular interpretation of the 'Garden Electric' theme, filled with bold color and interesting design elements that will really captivate our guests while the promenade-style path ensures that all visitors can closely enjoy these stunning works of art," says PHS Creative Director, Seth Pearsoll.

We need help from all the societies to look after the plants, while extolling the benefits of belonging to a plant society. You are not expected to answer questions about all the plants, but will be supplied with 3x5 cards where visitors will write their name and email, name of plant, and question which will be forwarded to the appropriate society for an answer. There will be brochures from the various plant societies and signage supplied by PHS. For breaks, there will be seating available on our director's chairs and on benches supplied by PHS just across the aisle. You will receive one Free Admission for each volunteer slot you sign up for. Two slots worked in a single day will earn you an extra entry ticket for a friend, or for yourself to use on another day.

Annual Meeting & Luncheon Report

The members and friends of the Delaware Valley Fern and Wildflower Society joined together for the Annual Meeting and Luncheon on Sat. Nov. 19th at 11:30am at Charlotte's Restaurant, 3207 West Chester Pike (Route 3), Newtown Square, PA.

Our speaker for the meeting, Jenny Rose Carey is a renowned gardener, educator, historian, and author. Her presentation for our get together was titled "Northview Through the Seasons, My Favorite Native Plants in the Garden". She is also the former senior director at the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society's Meadowbrook Farm in Jenkintown. Jenny Rose has been lecturing nationally and internationally for many years. She previously worked at Temple University, first as an adjunct professor in the Department of Landscape Architecture and Horticulture and then as director of the Ambler Arboretum. Her book, Glorious Shade: Dazzling Plants, Design Ideas, and Proven Techniques for Your Shady Garden, is a delight for the fern gardener.

In her book, *The Ultimate Flower Gardener's Guide: How to Combine Shape, Color, and Texture to Create the Garden of Your Dreams,* she proposes a holistic approach to flower gardening with a refreshing twist. Instead of concentrating primarily on color, it brings flower shape and texture to the fore, helping homeowners make plant choices that come together in an aesthetically pleasing way. The featured plants include both perennials and annuals, and all have been chosen for their ease of care, attractiveness to pollinators, and environmental friendliness. Carey also shares information on planning for year-round color and design strategies for a range of spaces.

Her talk with us at the meeting on November 19th was about her adventures with the native plants in her own garden at Northview.

Many of us are looking forward to seeing her garden at our field trip there in June.
